


Numbers of Reported EL Students Who Speak Chinese as a Home Language: SY 2008–09 through SY 2016–17

FACT Since SY 2008–09, the number of EL students in public elementary and secondary schools who speak Chinese as a home language increased by approximately 35 percent, or nearly 27,000 students.

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FACT

During the 2015–16 school year, West Virginia and New York had the highest percentages of EL students who spoke Chinese as a home language at 9.9 and 9.2 percent, respectively. Pennsylvania had the third-highest percentage of EL students who spoke Chinese language at 4.9 percent.
